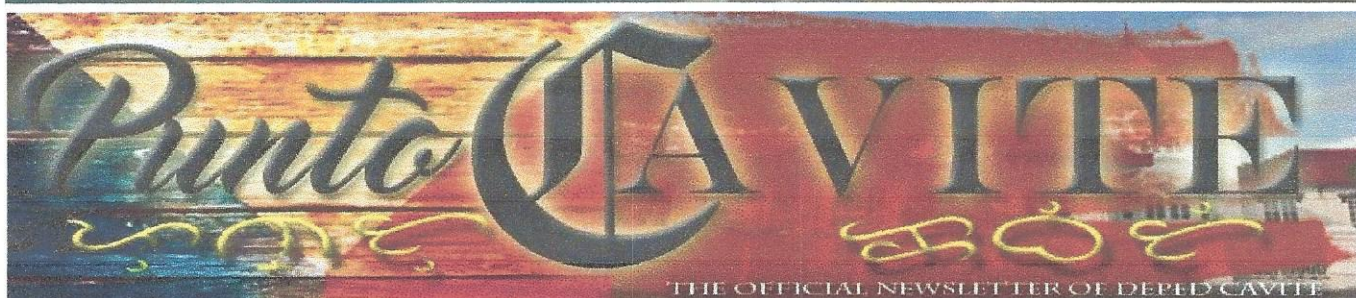

Continued supremacy

Five-peat complete as red-hot CALABARZON rules NSPC 2017

Clad in its signature red journalist's vest, CALABARZON marched to the region's first historic fifth straight championship after it dominated both individual and group events in the elementary and secondary levels in the recently concluded National Schools Press Conference (NSPC) in Pagadian City, Zamboanga del Sur on January 22 to 26.

CALABARZON drew first blood in the school paper contests as it posted a grandest record of claiming nine best school papers both in English and Filipino in Elementary and Secondary levels.

Leading the list of publication winners are The Martyrs (Trece Martires City National High School) and Ang Klaryon (Tanza National Comprehensive High School), hailed as the Best School Papers for English and Filipino category, respectively.

The Volcano from San Nicolas Central School and Paslit sa Bagong Henerasyon of San Miguel Elementary School also showed their dominance after being adjudged as the Most Outstanding School Papers in the Elementary level. Moreover, other Filipino school publications both in Elementary and Secondary from Cavite, Laguna, Batangas, Rizal, and Quezon also occupied the top seven spots.

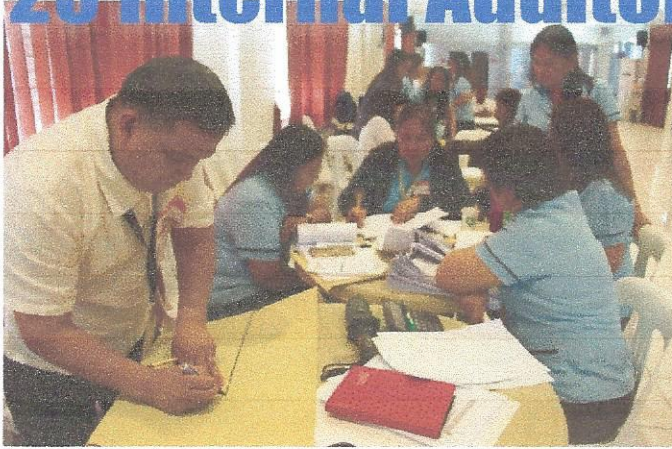
Cavite Province continued to live up to expectations as one of Region IV-A's leaders in campus journalism as CALABARZON marched to its historic fifth straight championship in the recently concluded National Schools Press Conference (NSPC), January 22-26, in Pagadian City, Zamboanga del Sur.

Cavite's The Martyrs (Trece Martires City National High School) and Ang Klaryon (Tanza National Comprehensive High School) were hailed as the Best School Papers in the Philippines in the English and Filipino category, secondary level, along with seven other CALABARZON publications (secondary and elementary level) which found their way to the top seven.

Ang Pandayan (Tanza National Trade School) and Ang Martires (Trece Martires City NHS) were named fourth and sixth best school paper, respectively, for the secondary level, Filipino category while The Westernlight (Gov. Ferrer Memorial NHS-Biclatan Annex) placed fifth for the English category.

DepEd conducts two-day ISO training; 25 Internal Auditors: accredited



Equipping its selected personnel with auditing knowledge and skills for the office's ISO implementation, Department of Education-Division of Cavite organized a two-day training course for Internal Auditors last January 30-31, at the Bulwagang Tanglaw, DepEd Compound, Trece Martirez City, Cavite.



Headed by NQA Global Certification Body representative Lorna Valdez, the training certified 25 new Internal Auditors after passing the evaluation examination administered on the last day of training.

Participated by all unit heads, assigned internal auditors, and ISO Team, the training also focused on understanding the needs, purpose, and benefits of preparing and conducting an audit relative to ISO 9001:2015 requirements.

During the first part of the training, Ms. Valdez discussed the Terms and Definition, Principle of Auditing, and Managing of an Audit Program.

On the second part, she taught the participants how to perform an audit and enumerated the competence required from an auditor and the evaluation they would undergo, as well as the examples of discipline pertaining to ISO 19011:2011.

To highlight the discussion, group workshops on identifying audit program risk,

preparing an audit plan, use of turtle diagram, and preparing an audit finding report, were also done. Quality Management principles, which include Customer Focus, Leadership, Engagement of People, Process Approach, Improvement, and Evidence-Based Decision Making, were emphasized.

DepEd Cavite's internal audit will start on February 9 until February 16, 2017.

The event is the first Cavite-wide gathering of in-school and out-of-school special children which used to be a two-hour program conducted simultaneously per municipality.

Advisers (MOSPA) and the Most Outstanding Campus Journalists (MOCJ) through Marivic Climacosa (Tanza National Trade School) and Julie Anne Vertudes (Carmona Elementary School) and Angelica Onsana (Tanza National Comprehensive High School) and Reign Razzyl Maey Abesia (Family Village Resources ES), respectively.

After the grueling four-day competition among the Philippines' best campus journalists, the red vested student-writers proved to be too much for the other regions as they topped the individual and group contests both in elementary and secondary level.

Meanwhile, Region III (Central Luzon) and Region XI (Davao) ranked second and third place, respectively, leaving the perennial bridesmaid, National Capital Region, out of the top three performing regions in this year's NSPC.

Dr. Diosdado M. San Antonio, DepEd-Region 4A regional director, lauded the students and school paper advisers for the record-setting peat, stressing that the win would serve as a reminder of the flare of the journalism in the region.

At the same time, RD San Antonio urged campus journalists to imbibe the lessons they learned during the competition and uphold their responsibility as individuals who use the power of the "fourth estate" to help the country overcome economic, natural, and societal drawbacks and difficulties.

"This five-peat should be taken as a driving force for aspiring media practitioners. Lead the country into enlightenment and awareness. Student journalists and school paper advisers (SPAs) continue the legacy you yourselves started with passion and determination," he said.

Meanwhile, Ms. Jennifer Lopez, DepEd-Region 4A Supervisor in Journalism, echoed the appeal of the keynote speaker Malou Mangahas to the country's campus journalists and

news industry aspirants during the opening program of the annual journalism competition.

"Inspiring others is the extension of journalism's reach. I want you to influence change. Be the change. Journalism is more than what we write, deliver, and tell," Lopez said.

Being the head of the first region to accomplish the five-peat in NSPC history, RD San Antonio also called for a more active involvement among Region IV-A's SPAs to ensure the continuity of the winning tradition.

He added that SPAs play a crucial role in preparing and honing student writers and broadcasters for future competitions.

"With the win, our teachers and school paper advisers are challenged to share valuable input during journalism trainings and symposiums. They should act as a support force for our young journalists," San Antonio added. (Patrick Coquilla, TMCNHS)

CIP rolls out in Cavite

Sixty (60) participants from the four strategic units of the Department of Education-Division of Cavite participated in the Continuous Improvement Program Division Roll-Out held at Tanza Oasis Hotel and Resort, Brgy. Capipisa, Tanza, Cavite, February 1-3, 2017.

Funded through the Human Resource and Development Fund of the SGO-D-HRD Unit, the roll-out aimed at articulating the basic understanding of the participants about CIP, explaining the CI Methodology and its steps, and demonstrating CI application at the school level with the guidance of the coach.

Each stage of the CI Methodology, which is also tied up with the School Improvement Planning (SIP), was managed by Lorena L. Arca, CI Master Coach (Stage 1 Assess); Theresa C. Bautista, CI Master Trainer (Stage 2 Analyze); and Marlene P. Panganiban, CI Master Trainer (Stage 3 Act).

CIP Teams from the North Unit were from Binakayan National High School (Kawit), Noveleta Elementary School, and Rosario Elementary School. From the East Unit, the CIP Team were from Bulihan National High School (Silang), Bancal Elementary School (Carmona), and San Gabriel II Elementary School (GMA). South Unit CIP Team included representatives from Alfonso National High School, Indang East Elementary School, and Amadeo Elementary School while the CIP Team from West Unit were from Amaya School of Home Industries (Tanza), Maragondon Elementary School, and Ternate Elementary School.

In her inspirational message, SDS Cherrylou D. de Mesa, stressed the importance of continuous improvement in the context of DepEd Cavite in order to raise the bar in all its performance indicators. SDO Cavite holds first Gawad Tulong Ugnayan

Department of Education-Division of Cavite, through its School-to-School Partnership Program (SSP) Team, conducted the first **Gawad Tulong Ugnayan**, February 2, at the Auditorium of Lyceum of the Philippines Cavite.

Attended by around 200 leader and partner school heads, SSP focal persons, Education Program Supervisors, Public Schools District Supervisors, and guests from the Provincial Government of Cavite and the Regional Field and Technical Assistance Division of Region IV-A CALABARZON, the event served as the highlight of the Division's SSP Program.

The gathering featured exhibits, action research presentation, one-minute film contest, and the awarding ceremony. For the SSP Exhibit, which showcased the outputs and benefits reaped by the schools during the implementation of the division program, Carmona bagged the Best Exhibit, People's Choice, Happy Che's Choice, and Director's Choice awards with its Sorte-embellished exhibit. Moreover, Carmona's *Gintong Ani ng SSP* entry from Maduya Elementary School and Milagrosa West Elementary School won as Best One-Minute Film, People's Choice Award, Happy Che's Choice Award, and the Director's Choice Award.

Meanwhile, Lapidario Elementary School and Southville Elementary School's Project ReFUN, Kaytitinga Elementary School and Sulsugin Elementary School's Project STAR, and Osorio Elementary School and Conchu Elementary School's Project TEACH were recognized as the Best Action Researches while Aguado Elementary School and Bagong Pook Elementary School's Regional Awardee for Best Action

Research, Implementation of SSP Program: Contributing Factors to the Reading Ability was given a special citation.

The Division SSP Team also selected three best documentation outputs among the 29 program implementers. Noveleta Elementary School and Gahak Marulas Elementary School placed first in the Best SSP Documentation contest, followed by Trece Martires City Elementary School and Kanggahan Elementary School (Second Place) and Kaytitinga Elementary School and Sulsugin Elementary School (Third Place).

Ms. Norielyn C. Narciso, school head, Halang Banaybanay National High School, was hailed the SSP Outstanding School Head Leader (School Category) while Ms. Basilisa R. Digma, school head, Bagong Pook Elementary School, was recognized as SSP Outstanding School Head Partner (School Category).

For the Best SSP Implementer Category, five partnerships were also given recognition for their exemplary achievements in ensuring the quality of instruction and support to curriculum implementation. Aguado Elementary School and Bagong Pook Elementary School won the First Place followed by San Gabriel Elementary School and San Jose Elementary School (Second Place); Trece Martires City Elementary School and Kanggahan Elementary School (Third Place); Balsahan Elementary School and Bucana Sasahan Elementary School (Fourth Place); and Kaytitinga Elementary School and Sulsugin Elementary School (Fifth Place).

ReachSearch, an action research journal which features 24 action researches on School-to-School Partnership Program initiated and conducted by the SSP Implementers, was also launched during the event.

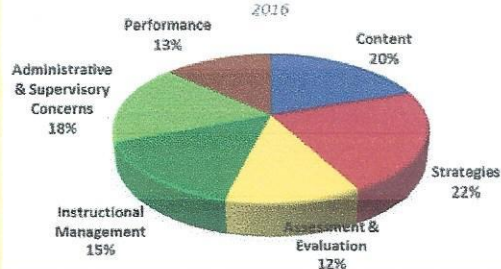
Total Number of School Heads and Key Teachers Capacitated

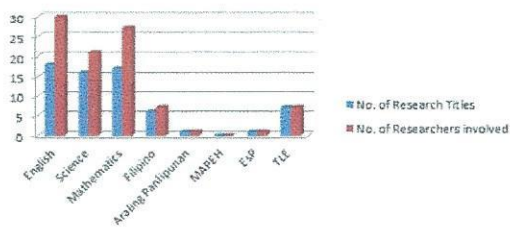

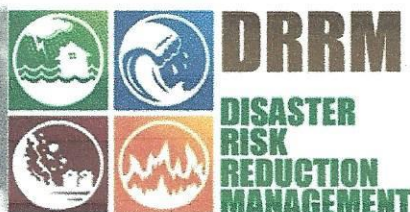

Determined to contribute to the five-peat championship of Region IV-A, the Filipino Secondary TV

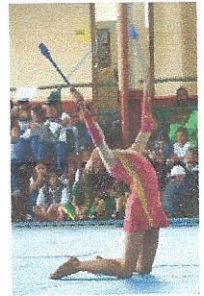
